

Yoslin Amaya Hernandez



They have helped her exceed in school. She began to seek advocating opportunities with Generation Hope when she stepped foot on her college campus and jumped through hurdles to get to where she wanted to be.

Yoslin hopes her degree in politics will propel her to make a change for student parents and for immigrants.


